# The Audio Moth Project

Our audio moth project has now concluded and the equipment returned to Birdlife Australia. Thanks to Directors Colin, Anne and Peter for their involvement. Judith's Swamp had dried for the later months of the survey but who knows what species may have been recorded during the wet and dry phases? (I'll let you know when we find out)

# **Real Moths and Butterflies**

Two of our members (Trevor and Jan Kennedy) attended the working Bee on 21 March. As well as working hard they also took a keen interest in some of our flying fauna. Trevor sent me the attached report. We look forward to learning more if they are able to survey more regularly!

# Butterflies at Kurri Kurri during 20-21<sup>st</sup> March, 2021



Jan and I picked up saws and set off to the western boundary to clear the fence and to assess the main areas of kikuyu. Immediately, something was different to home in Kirkstall. It was the butterflies along the first part of the track. There were many Common Brown females – not unexpected – and they rose from their resting place on the ground (above). What was unexpected was the number of male Common Browns. I hadn't seen more than 1 or 2 on any recent day at Kirkstall. And they were all so dilapidated – torn and worn from a hard season's competing and mating (below). When I took another look at the butterflies that



afternoon, numbers of males and females were almost equal. It seemed like the season was later for them in the perhaps wetter Kurri Kurri than further west. The appearance of the Common Browns at home had followed a fairly usual pattern. The males arrived first, spending a lot of time in the sun competing, sometimes quite aggressively, for territory. The females this season arrived 3 weeks later, resting in shaded areas near the edges of the windbreaks. Once mating had occurred, the males started to become dishevelled and drop in numbers dropping almost to zero by the end of March. But the females lay low over the hottest part of the season and emerged in autumn from their rest to begin egg-laying on the native and introduced grasses that are the larval food. **\*Question**: How many legs did these butterflies have?



We were almost out to the boundary when a small, fluttering butterfly caught my eye. It was reluctant to rest and a second one joined it. It

was a Skipper of some species but I was unable to photograph it for identification. Very frustrating! It could have been any of half a dozen species. More frustrating was seeing several more as we returned along the track flying up without stopping for a selfie with me. Finally, near the first track junction, I was able to positively identify it as a Bright Shield-skipper which I have seen at Craig's Lane, Grass Tree Plain, Narringal, St. Helens and Pallisters Reserve. Its larvae feed on native grasses. It's mainly seen from January to March. The larvae actually overwinter and feed moving out from shelters in the grass. They pupate and emerge over spring and summer. We went out again on Sunday and photographed quite a number along Goy Tk.

We found many small Common Grass-blues



only occasionally in the bush but most commonly along the boundaries where there are introduced clovers and other legumes which support the pealoving larvae and adults. It was a warm day and I saw none with their wings open to absorb solar power. My photos were mostly males (left,right). It has been a good year for them generally with many more at home than last year. They are present from October to April but have been recorded all year round in some areas of Victoria.

Finally, there were just a few Cabbage Whites while previously, I'd seen a



Marbled Xenica near the shelter. A pleasant surprise was a number of moths that were flying, while late March is a good time for wasps too. Next year, I'll try to survey across the whole season.

# 2021 Annual General Meeting

2020-21 was a year of contrasts. The first half of the year was again challenging, complying with Covid 19 restrictions and maintaining Zoom meetings. In contrast, it was great to be able to meet again in person in the second half of the year with the relaxation of restrictions. In spite of these challenges there has been some action out on the block.

- Regular working bees continue to be a focus. Major tasks, as always, have been concerned with maintaining our fencing to help ensure good neighbour relationships, clearing of blackberries and other weeds, maintenance of our internal walking tracks and tidying up around the sheds. In addition, there was a load of gravel delivered to improve the access track into the block.
- One exciting project undertaken by the group this year was our involvement in the 'Wetland Bird Life Project' conducted by Birdlife Australia. We were on the lookout for bitterns. An audio moth was set up on the block and a roster established to ensure the files were downloaded and sent off on a regular basis. Our thanks to Laura for initiating our contact and Colin for being ahead of the game in terms of the technology. Thanks also for the members who were involved in the roster. Sadly no bitterns on our block!
- New members continue to revitalize our group, with five joining Kurri Kurri in the previous 12 months. We hope that in the near future we can welcome everyone back out to the block. We also continue to encourage members to find new (younger) members to ensure the longer-term viability of our cooperative.

As always, I would like to acknowledge and thank my fellow Board members for their valuable contributions and dedication to Kurri Kurri. In particular, our hard working and dedicated treasurer, who has kept us financially stable, and our diligent secretary who has kept us all up to date with all things Kurri Kurri through our interesting newsletters. # A Note from our Treasurer (Kevin):

As in the past 2 years, again this year our auditor has transferred Donated and Forfeited Shares from Share Capital into Retained Earnings (\$1750). This is on paper only and has no effect on our finances. Two members donated shares back from their estates and three lots of shares have been forfeited due to non-payment of levies. This skews our Income for the year, in fact instead of making a surplus as per page 1, we have actually only broke even, see Statement of Cash Flows. This justifies our recommendation last year to increase our Levy to \$20 per year (or \$80 for 5 years). You will notice that there was no Administrative Grant offered by GHCMA last year (previous \$500) and our Interest from Term Deposits is at record lows.

The increase in levy last year has only just started to filter through the system as most members pay their levy in 5-year lots. Therefore, we are not recommending a further increase in the levy this year.

Also, the current Moyne Shire valuation of our property has been updated in our list of assets. This revaluation has allowed us to receive a better rate reduction as negotiated by Trust for Nature for properties with a covenant attached. Our rates have reduced from \$618 to \$547 for 2020-2021.
